Seed Lending Library: One Last Planting

Before we put our gardens to bed we still can do one last planting. It is very simple to do and in August next year you will have a nice harvest of homegrown garlic. Garlic roots develop during the fall and winter—before the ground freezes—and by early spring, they start producing foliage. Garlic prefers rich, well-drained, and weed-free soil located in full sun.

Get garlic bulbs from a local farmer or healthy looking large organic bulbs at the grocery store. Begin by breaking apart the heads of garlic into cloves, no need to peel. Each clove will produce a bulb of garlic.

Space the cloves 4-6 inches apart. Rows should be spaced one foot apart. The cloves should be planted with the pointed end up and the blunt end down. Push each clove 1-2" into the ground, firm the soil around it, and water the bed if it is dry. No more watering is necessary before spring.

After planting, lay down a protective mulch of straw, chopped leaves or grass clippings. Mark the location so you find the little sprouts in the spring.


