





Earth Day - April 22, 2020 50 Years of Environmental Awareness

Earth Day was a unified response to an environment in crisis oil spills, smog, rivers so polluted they literally caught fire. On April 22, 1970, 20 million Americans—10% of the U.S. population at the time—took to the streets, college campuses and hundreds of cities to protest environmental ignorance and demand a new way forward for our planet.

The first Earth Day is credited with launching the modern environmental movement, and is now recognized as the planet's largest civic event.

What was the result of the first Earth Day?

The first Earth Day in 1970 launched a wave of action, including the passage of landmark environmental laws in the United States. The Clean Air, Clean Water and Endangered Species Acts were created in response to the first Earth Day in 1970, as well as the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Many countries soon adopted similar laws. Earth Day continues to hold major international significance: In 2016, the United Nations chose Earth Day as the day when the historic Paris Agreement on climate change was signed into force. I met two delightful girls and their circles of friends this weekend despite preserving my social distancing! Yes, I'm talking about the heroines and supporting characters in the above two books.

Clementine is the lonely daughter of the Dark Lord Elithor and will take over the title someday. Her father alternates between neglectful and ranting over her faults, she can only observe the village children

and ranting over her faults, she can only observe the village children playing from a distance since they fear her as their sorcerous future ruler, and the only mother she's known is a white splotch of snow on the mountains called the White Lady. But when her father, whom she loves despite everything, is cursed, Clementine rises to the occasion in her own way, taking care of the farm, committing Dastardly Deeds to keep their home, and breaking her father's rules to save him—by making friends.

Teresita Mariana de Sousa, or Tess as her friends call her and she has many friends, is a foundling with a scientific bent. Newspaper Planter

In honor of Earth Day on April 22, let's plant something!

Watch for a video tutorial on Instagram and Facebook

Materials needed:
1 newspaper page
1 canned good
Garden soil
Seed of your choosing
That's it!



- 1. Lay out your newspaper page so that the long side is facing you.
- 2. Fold your newspaper into thirds, top to bottom.
- 3. Place your can on one end of the folded newspaper.
- 4. Tightly roll the newspaper around the can.
- 5. Roll until you reach the end of the paper.
- 6. Gently wiggle the can out of the newspaper slightly, so there is about 2" of rolled paper no longer hugging the can.
- 7. Take the 2" of paper you just freed & tuck it up under the can. Make sure you tuck all the excess paper tightly so that your soil will stay in place.
- 8. Gently wiggle out the rest of the can from the paper.
- 9. Grab your soil, moisten slightly so that the soil is damp like a sponge but not dripping.
- 10. Fill the newspaper planter with moist soil.
- 11. Plant your seed according to the directions on the seed packet.
- 12. Leave in a sunny window & keep moist.
- 13. Soon your seed shall sprout!
