FIRST TO BE SEEN IN DOCUMENTATION

- Potentially arrived in England through Italy/Spain/ Portugal.
- One of eight trumpeters permanently employed in King Henry VII and VIIIs courts.
- First Black musician documented in Tudor England.
- Played the Tudor trumpet, something prestigious royal servants would have played.
- Received room and board; annual wage of 12 pounds; successfully petitioned for a pay raise during his tenure.



FIRST TO PUBLISH

VICENTE LUSITANO (APPROX. 1520 - APPROX. 1561)

- First Black Published Composer: composer of choral works, motets and madrigals
- Theorist: advocated (and won?) traditional values of diatonic, chromatic

IGNATIUS SANCHO (APPROX.1729 –1780)

- Informal Education: Learned to read, write, and immersed himself in poetry and music.
- Writer: He wrote and published a Theory of Music, a set of songs, two dances, two plays, and countless letters and articles under his own name and under the pseudonym "Africanus."
- Voting: He was the first person of African origin known to have voted in Britain.

A PAN-AFRICANIST PROMOTER

• Composer: Included African music traditions in his music and was very influenced by African American culture. Learned to read, write, and immersed himself in poetry and music.

•Seen as a figure of hope for Black Americans post Civil War/Reconstruction who were facing systemic political, social, and economic repression.

•Music: He wrote and published over 80 works including symphonies, opera, choral and vocal works, chamber music, and concerti.

•Hiawatha is a grand choral work with full orchestra and stands as his most celebrated work.

THOSE WHO DOCUMENTED

JAMES M. TROTTER (1842-1892)

- Born an enslaved person of mixed ethnicity in 1842
- Educator, soldier, music historian, author
- Music and Some Highly Musical People, published 1878.

MAUD CUNEY HARE (1874-1936)

- Pianist (NEC), musicologist, writer, and activist
- Founded Allied Art Center in Boston
- Negro Musicians and Their Music, published 1936.



DEAN OF AFRICAN AMERICAN COMPOSERS

• Musician: Started violin lessons at age 14 and taught himself how to play the clarinet, saxophone, oboe, double bass, cello and viola.

•Studies: Attended Oberlin College in 1917 and later studied with composers George Chadwick in Boston and Edgar Varese in NYC.

• Music: He created nearly 200 musical works including solos, chamber works, ballets, operas, and symphonies including the Afro-American Symphony. style embraced contemporary complexities
