




Ask the Passengers by A.S. King






Freaks and Revelations by Davida Wills Hurwin




Parrotfish by Ellen Wittlinger




Huntress by Malinda Lo






The Miseducation of Cameron Post by Emily Danforth




Rage: A Love Story by Julie Anne Peters






Wildthorn by Jane Eagland



The school bookie says the odds are 12-to-1 against him getting Noah back, but Paul's not giving up without playing his love really loud. His best friend Joni might be drifting away, his other best friend Tony might be dealing with ultra-religious parents, and his ex-boyfriend Kyle might not be going away anytime soon, but sometimes everything needs to fall apart before it can really fit together right. This is a happy-meaningful romantic comedy about finding love, losing love, and doing what it takes to get love back in a crazy-wonderful world.








Aristotle and Dante Discover the Secrets of the Universe by Benjamin Alire Sáenz






Out of the Pocket by Bill Konigsburg




Openly Straight by Bill Konigsburg
