reetings from Literacy Unlimited,

and welcome (or welcome back) to this wonderful community of tutors, class leaders, and benefactors. I am incredibly excited to be here and to serve all of you as well as the students. When I started in March of this year, Framingham Library was still closed to the public, and my first introduction to the Literacy staff (Karen Boudreau, office manager; LieHua Shi, database administrator; Marjie Soloman, office assistant; and Laurie Christie, Natick coordinator) was in a Zoom meeting. It has been quite the transition for me to learn the ropes (many thanks to retired coordinator, Anne O'Connell for staying on to train me) as well as experience the reopening of the library and Literacy Unlimited for in-person activities.

I am excited for the fall and what the year has to bring, although I am aware we live in uncertain times. We are all still experiencing shock waves from the beginning of the pandemic; I often feel exhausted and even discouraged as I listen to the news about Covid-19.

What I want you to know is that we are making decisions based on the circumstances, and that your safety, as well as the students' safety, is paramount.

Currently, we wear masks in the Library; Literacy continues to be open, and you can come in and tutor

with your student. We have rearranged our space and created three socially distanced cubicles; you can call or email us to set up a time to meet with your student. We are acquiring a plethora of clear face mask options to help make your excellent lessons on pronunciation more accessible to students. We started our first in-person, beginning English class in over a year! Approximately 10 students attend the class, which is held in the Costin Room to allow for safe distancing.

Of course, we will continue to offer virtual events and resources for you as well. We will host "Tutor Time" on Zoom, a combined office hours/technological training session at least once a month. We are also happy to help you troubleshoot a specific skill you want to master to enhance your remote tutoring experience. Please reach out to let us know what you need from us in a remote/hybrid learning space.

I come on the heels of amazing progress and innovation thanks to Anne and the staff. This year I want to celebrate how far Literacy has come during this time, and to focus on reconnection as well. If we haven't met, I encourage you to introduce yourself by phone, email, or in-person. I want to hear how you are connected to this community, which is our legacy, after all.

From the Advisory Board

That is why the Literacy Unlimited team of dedicated tutors found many creative ways to continue to teach their students throughout the Covid crisis. Because they could not meet face-to-face with their students, almost every tutor had to take a crash course in Zoom technology. Tutors and students learned together how to make this new normal work for them. Some used computers, others used phones or iPads. Creative ways to use pictures, music, chalk boards, etc., to teach the English language were put into play with great success. Along with the one-to-one lessons, the group classes continued as well.

Thanks to the tireless efforts of some tutors who are very well-versed computer experts, the tutors themselves were taught how to best utilize Zoom and the myriad of online ESOL support websites.

Unfortunately, we were unable to hold our May Basket Fundraiser this past year, but an inflow of generous donations in honor of Anne O'Connell's dedication to Literacy Unlimited helped us through the year.

Just recently the Framingham Library reopened allowing tutors and students once again to be able to learn together. 


Where are our students by town?
