With great pride, we opened the Citizenship Corner, a dedicated section of the 3rd floor for citizenship and literacy resources. Grant money from the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners, under the Library Services and Technology Act, allowed us to purchase new furniture, computer, and print resources. Also included in the grant was an expansion of our conversation classes in Framingham. We hired Wayne Sullivan to teach two classes each Saturday (Beginner and Intermediate). The grand opening in March was attended by the Mayor and other politicians as well as students, tutors and staff.

We also conducted 3 citizenship classes in Framingham – two Civics and American History with instructor Christopher Ahearn (intermediate level speakers) and Civics and Literacy with instructor Alice Carroll (low level English speakers). Our students are becoming citizens!

This has been a busy year in Natick. We have had two well attended, ten-week Citizenship Classes, led by tutor Isabel Wesley. We held a workshop for tutors with John McCarthy of United States Citizenship and Immigration Services to help guide students through the preparation for the interview. Plans are in the works to add more dedicated citizenship resources to the library.

Conversation Groups have grown to capacity and we are anxious to add more sessions. This year, we held two tutor trainings which have helped us to increase our volunteer tutor base, so we can help more students. The library has purchased about 40 new titles in Spanish, Russian and Chinese for International Language pleasure reading. The program is strong and growing!

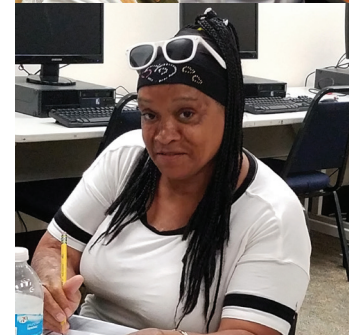

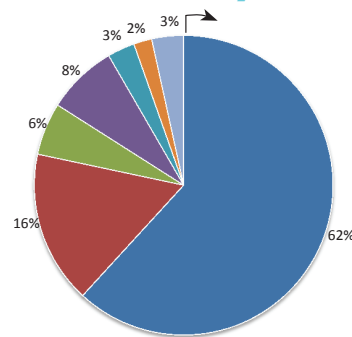

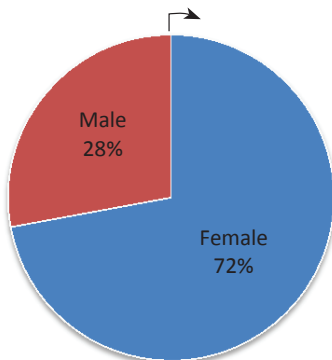


Students by Town

Students by Gender



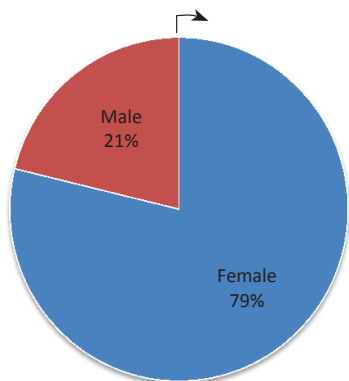
In 2018, we served 405 students:

They range in age from 19 to 86! 189 are currently matched with a tutor (and working very hard), 134 have finished their work with our program, and 82 students remain on the waiting list. 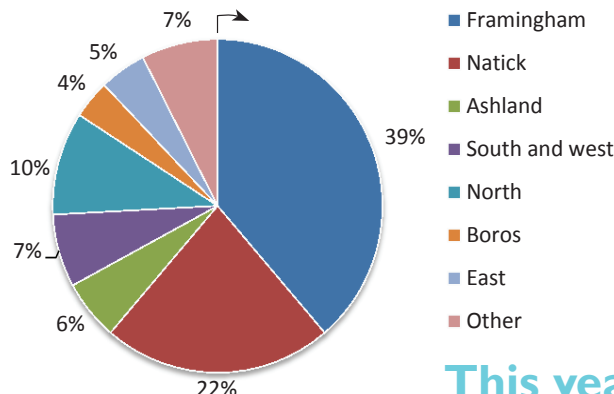

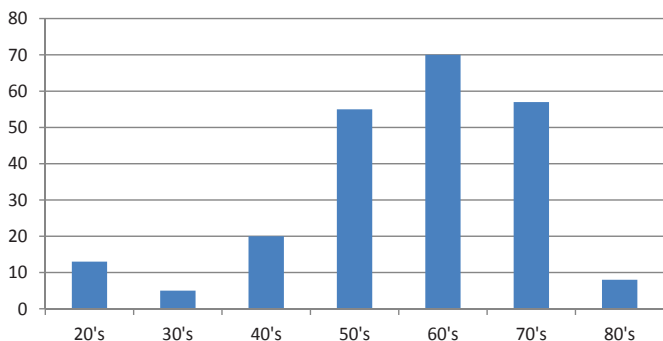
Tutors by Gender



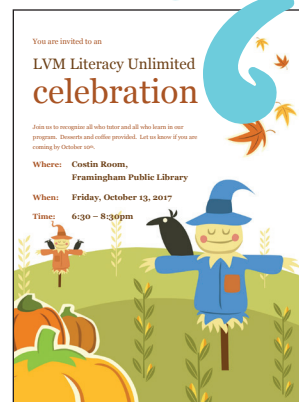
Tutors by Town

This year we had 270 wonderful tutors -

234 are active today and 38 have moved on to other volunteer activities. The tutors accumulated 6132.5 hours while working with their students! We also ran many conversation classes with very dedicated leaders who presented 688 hours of classes!

An excellent year for training new tutors: we completed 7 trainings with a total of 76 new tutors.
